Embracing New Opportunities Facing the Future in the New Normal

Dear Friends,

We are beginning to come out from the dark days of COVID-19. We all desire the return of normalcy. But it may not necessarily be the normalcy we remember. We are a different people now because of our experience with COVID-19. What the new normalcy will be is an open-ended question. The way the Church did things in the past does not have to be the way we will do things in the future. This is a time of discernment. What is God calling us and leading us to be and do in the days and years ahead?

When World War II broke out in Europe, all the major powers had to move quickly to raise up their armed forces and all available weapon systems had to be utilized. In the case of the British army, this meant re-activating equipment that had not been used since the Boer war in South Africa a half century earlier. One piece of light artillery in particular had an interesting firing procedure. Per the operating manual, five men were assigned to fire the cannon. The number of crew members were required to perform an odd ritual. When the cannon was loaded and ready to fire, two members of the crew would snap to attention and remain that way until after the cannon was fired. The artillery officers were baffled by this routine and saw no need for those two soldiers. Finally, a long-retired artillery officer was called in to watch the firing procedure. After observing the unit fire the cannon several times, he exclaimed, "I have it! They're holding the horses."

During the Boer War, horses were the principal means of transporting artillery and moving it into firing position. This particular cannon would have required two horses, and therefore two soldiers had to hold the reins of the horses when the cannon was fired to keep the animals from running off. Horses had long since been phased out, but the five-man crew was left intact. This meant that two of the five soldiers merely functioned as placeholders.

The challenge for us today is to recognize the areas in which we need to change, to stop being placeholders so as to have a greater impact in the world as followers of Jesus Christ. Change is inevitable. We have to move forward with Jesus lest we lose our sacred mission of doing and being the Church and end up holding the reins of a horse that no longer exists. The vestry has begun a process of reflection on adapting Holy Trinity Church to a post-pandemic time. What events should be retained? What are the mission opportunities? How shall we be structured to meet these new opportunities? I invite you to join in this conversation. Please share your thoughts and ideas with me, the wardens, or any vestry member. Together in Christ we will journey into this new day!

Butterfly Garden

Back in April, we were contacted by Stephanie Pierson, a member of Liberti Church who is part of the Rutgers University Environmental Stewards Program. Stephanie's project is to establishing Monarch Butterfly Habitats at all of the churches in Collingswood to help demonstrate the church's role in preserving and appreciating God's creation. In order to make this project a reality, Stephanie is partnering

with a local Girl Scout troop, led by Lisa Casswell. Due to our ideal location both for the plants and for public access and visibility, Holy Trinity was chosen as the pilot church for this project, and in early May, Lisa and several girls from her troop got to work planting Monarch habitat plant kits donated by the Horticultural Society of SJ. The plants are now fairly well established with lovely blooms in several colors, which will hopefully attract many beautiful monarchs this summer. We were thrilled to be part of this project. Please take a look as you walk past the parking lot on Haddon Avenue.

Bird Houses

Not only do we have a new butterfly garden, we now have three very

pretty birdhouses and some lovely new flowering bushes on the far side of the parking lot driveway. Our neighbor, Mike Almond, who has donated several bushes and trees, added the birdhouses and shrubs which add some more cheerful color over on that side of the property. COVID Safety Protocol Update From the Diocese of New Jersey...

For the fully Vaccinated – Masks do not need to be worn inside or outside, social distancing is not necessary. The lectern side of the Church is open seating. Sit where you like and with whom you like. It is OK to sing and to use the Prayer Books and Hymnals in the pew racks.

For Children, Youths and the

<u>Unvaccinated</u> – Masks need to be worn inside and social distancing observed. The pulpit side of the Church is for restricted seating for family units and others who observe social distancing. It is OK to sing and use the books in the pew racks.

For All – It's always OK to wear a mask anywhere and stay distanced as you are comfortable. If you don't feel well, stay home and watch the service on-line. As of yet there is no change on how we receive communion or the distanced exchange of the Peace.
